In recent correspondence to the Judicial Investigation Commission you asked for some guidance whether or not in the form of an advisory opinion about one of your probation officers who is a close personal friend and fellow church member with Candidate The probation officer serves in the Judicial Circuit consisting of and Counties and lives in West Virginia, just a few minutes from the courthouse. His primary case load is comprised of juveniles and he has served in this capacity since the late 1980's. He has never been especially concerned in political races before, but because of his he has asked you whether he can attend political meetings of friendship with and assist in his campaign. The proposed activities would not take place within his circuit and would not involve making any public verbal endorsement as an employee or representative of the West Virginia Supreme Court.

The Commission has reviewed your request at its recent meeting. The hours and availability responsibilities of a probation officer appear to be somewhat unique from other judicial employees. It is the understanding of the Commission that a probation officer is virtually on call any time of the day or week and must be able to provide assistance to those individuals coming under his purview. Because of the unique schedule and time restraints placed on a probation officer, it is the feeling of the Commission that spending much time outside his circuit to be actively involved in the activities stated by you would cause a problem.

It is hoped the questions which you have raised have been fully addressed. If there is any further question regarding this matter do not hesitate to contact the Commission.
