Dear

In recent correspondence to the Commission you asked for an advisory opinion. In that letter you stated that a young, single probation officer who works out of the office. but who has to live in County because rent is so high in . County, would like to because he is very proactive in supervising his probationers. You live closer to stated that you are not engaged in the real estate rental business but that you do own a little that would probably suit him e about ten minutes from cottage on the well. This man is one of the best probation officers you have and you have a fear that you may lose him to the federal system or to neighboring l. You are willing to rent your cottage to him for roughly the same cost as he is paying in County. You asked whether such an arrangement would be offensive to the Code of Judicial Conduct.

To address the question which you have raised, the Commission has reviewed relevant sections of Canon 4 of the Code of Judicial Conduct. Those sections state as follows:

- Canon 4. A judge shall so conduct the judge's extra-judicial activities as to minimize the risk of conflict with judicial obligations.
- D. Financial activities. (1) A judge shall not engage in financial and business dealings that:
 - (a) may reasonably be perceived to exploit the judge's judicial position, or
 - (b) involve the judge in frequent transactions or continuing business relationships with those lawyers or other persons likely to come before the court on which the judge serves.

This section of the Code of Judicial Conduct defines some of the business relationships a judge is prohibited from forming. The individual which you describe in your correspondence does not fall within either category set forth in Canon 4D(b). For those reasons it is the opinion of the Commission that you may rent your cottage to the probation officer.

It is hoped that this opinion fully addresses the question which you have raised. If there is any further question regarding this matter do not hesitate to contact the Commission.
