Re: JIC Advisory Opinion 2022-07

Dear Judge

Your recent request for an advisory opinion was reviewed by the Judicial Investigation Commission. The facts giving rise to your request are as follows: You are running for judge in your circuit in the May 2022 election for judge. You want to know how long you must disclose that a lawyer who appears in front of you has also served as a member of your campaign committee.

In JIC Advisory Opinion 1995-34, the Commission stated that a judge running for office had a duty to disclose that attorneys appearing in his/her courtroom were serving on his/her campaign committee and to follow Trial Court Rule 17 if a Motion to Disqualify was filed. However, the opinion never addressed the length of time that a judge must disclose the relationship. The Commission is of the opinion that the judge must disclose the nature of the relationship when the lawyer becomes a member of the campaign committee and should continue to do so for one year after the judicial candidate takes office or for one year after the dissolution of the campaign committee, whichever is longer.
